- must use effective classroom management skills to provide a learning atmosphere of support and encouragement.
- are responsible for making active efforts to communicate with parents and involve them in the educational process.
- must be committed to their own on-going professional development.
- are most effective when they are supported and encouraged, and when their skills and contributions are valued.

School Policies

Assembly

Parents are welcome to attend if their child is participating.

Attendance

Parents, please contact the school office by 8:40 a.m. if your child is going to be absent. We will attempt to make contact with you from 9:00 a.m. onwards if we have not received word of your child's absence.

Children will be considered late after 8:45 a.m. Letters from the attendance officer will be sent home if your child is late more than ten times per term.

ALL STUDENTS are expected to be off premises no later than 4:00 p.m. No adult supervision is provided after this time.

Bus – Please note that any student who misbehaves will be given a warning the first time. If a second misbehavior occurs, parents will be notified. If, by chance, a third report is given to the principal for misbehavior of a student, then parents will need to make alternative plans for the next ten (10) school days.

Class Parents

At the "Back to School" night in September, two parents from each class will be encouraged to become the "class" representatives. These parents will be responsible for communicating with other parents about class activities and for transportation for class trips.

Food Policy

Children are not allowed to consume junk food (soda, lunchables, candy, chips or french fries, etc.) Please do not bring glass bottles to school. Food from restaurants should NOT be brought to school. Please put hot food in a thermos. Microwaveable food is not accepted. All children should have a piece of fresh fruit to eat at recess. Kindly pack your child's lunch in plastic containers, as we are a 'trash free' school.

Handwriting

The D'Nealian handwriting scheme is used throughout the school.

Homework Policy

Homework is set daily in all classes. Parents are encouraged to monitor and sign the student's homework daily. Failure to complete or return homework three times in any one term will earn an after school detention. Parents will be notified.

Homework Schedule Per Night

P1 – 15 minutes	P2 – 20 minutes
P3 – 30 minutes	P4 – 40 minutes
P5 – 50 minutes	P6 – 60 minutes

The above does not include silent reading. When a child has not completed the homework in the allocated time, but the parent is satisfied that the child has tried his/her best, the parent may write a short note to this effect. In this case, the child will not be penalized.

Literacy

At West Pembroke School, we are committed to ensuring that our students graduate with the highest levels of proficiency in all areas of literacy. The various components of our literacy program are listed below.

It is our aim that each child in P1-P6 will read to an adult at school and at home each day. Each child has a reading log and this will go home every day so that parents may also hear their child read.

Reading Intervention:

Provided for students who require additional services in understanding how words work in the guided reading process. These sessions last from 45 min. to 60 min. depending on year level.

Music – Choir

Students from primary four through six may join the choir.

Music is provided for each class once a week.

Instrumental Music

The Menuhin teachers provide free instrumental lessons for a few students from Primary four every Friday morning. Students must be willing to practice at home regularly.

Numeracy

Primary 1 and 2 students should commit basic addition and subtraction facts to memory while the P3 students should add the multiplication tables of 2,5,10 and 11 memory. Primary 4 to P6 students should commit all to memory.

<u>P.T.A.</u>

There are a variety of social events during the year. General meetings are held on the third Tuesday of each month, commencing at 5:30 p.m. Parents are strongly encouraged to become actively involved with the work of the P.T.A.

Reports

Reports are sent home twice per year. Each parent will also be offered an interview with the class teacher, the counselor or the principal at any time.

School Day

The bell rings at 8:40 a.m. (All children are encouraged to arrive between 8:30 a.m. and 8:40 a.m.) Please be mindful that teachers are not required to be on duty until 8:30 a.m. Your child may bring a book to read, a puzzle book etc. to engage him/herself in a meaningful activity. This is not the time for students to run about.

Visitors:

You are instructed to use a PARENT PASS, which allows you, the parent, to walk freely through the corridors. Please ensure that you return the pass to the office at the end of your visit.

Volunteers: Parents are strongly encouraged to volunteer for duties at school. We are always in need of persons to assist with lunchtime duty, hearing children read and assisting with clerical work. Please call the principal.

Reading Counts;

We believe that the most effective way for children to master reading is for them to have plenty of opportunities to practice their skills. The children in primary three, four, five and six have at least twenty minutes of independent reading per day. During this time, the children read books from the Reading Counts program. This is an exciting program for children. At the end of each book read, the children can take a test on the computer and earn points towards our inventive program.

Morning Drop Off

Please drive past the office and drop off your child near the infant block. This allows for a free flow of traffic and for the parking of cars opposite the office. Please do not drive your car to the back of the main building, unless you are staying for a while. This is a gathering area for the children in the morning, also for teachers to park their cars. Please decrease your speed when entering school premises. Speed bumps have been put in place.

Afternoon Pick Up

Please pick up your child from the steps in the front of the school. All students are expected to be off site by 4:00 p.m.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

We have very strict guidelines when it comes to the uniform. As follows:

<u>**Girls uniform</u>**: girls in P1-P3 must wear heather gray gimp/tunic, white shirt, gray socks, school tie (purchased from Gibbons Co.) and black shoes, girls in P4-P6 must wear heather gray skirts, white school shirt with WPS initials, gray socks, school tie, and black shoes.</u>

During the winter the girls are allowed to wear gray tights or gray socks. They are not allowed to wear both together.

Boys uniform: All boys must wear heather gray trousers/shorts, gray socks, white school shirt with WPS initials, school tie and black shoes.

NB. If students do not wear the school shirt with WPS, they MUST wear their school tie.

Boys Haircuts:

BASIC HAIR CUTS ONLY. NO MOHAWKS, NO WRITINGS, NO ZIG ZAGS WILL BE ALLOWED.

The gimps/tunics, skirts, shorts/trousers, socks and tights and school shirts with WPS initials, sweaters, vests can be purchased at English Sports Shop on Front Street, and our school tie can be purchased from Gibbons Co. or English Sports Shop.

<u>P.E. uniforms</u>: can be purchased from Sidekicks in the Washington Mall.

<u>Sneakers must be all white or all black</u>. White ankle length socks with white sneakers and black ankle length socks with black sneakers are to be worn. NO MULTIPLE COLORS.

Three infractions and a detention will be given for incorrect uniform. If your child is not wearing his/her correct uniform, kindly send a note to the principal/teacher. Please ensure that sneakers, especially white ones, are clean at all times.

DRESS CODE :

In order to build school pride and identity, we expect our students to wear their full school uniform with dignity and recognize that they are subject to school rules. Parents/guardians have the responsibility to ensure that their children comply with their school's standard of dress.

JEWELRY :

While in school uniform, students may not wear chains, rings, or bracelets of any sort. Boys and girls are permitted to wear only gold or silver stud earrings in both ears. Hoop earrings are not allowed.

Students may wear a watch to school.

WEST PEMBROKE SCHOOL RULES

- Students are expected to be kind to each other and not tease. Teasing results in loss of recess. In severe cases the student may be placed in detention, or removed for a period of time from the other students.
- Students are expected to show respect to all adults and one another.
- Students are expected to follow all instructions given by school personnel and parent volunteers. The punishment for the offence is, at the least, detention.
- Children are expected to wear a helmet when riding a bicycle to school. Once on school grounds, students are expected to walk their bikes immediately to the designated parking area, which is below the underpass on the left of the stairs to the computer room. Should your child receive three detentions in a term for whatever reason, parents will be contacted and in-school suspension may be given.
- Children must stay in sight and not wander into the bushes or off the field during the lunch period.
- Students are expected to be in school by 8:40 a.m.
- Students will conduct themselves in a respectful manner at all times.
- Students will walk inside the building and to their specialist lessons in an orderly and timely manner.
- Students will respond promptly to all bells.
- Only Primary 3 students are allowed in the south building after the lunch bell has sounded.
- Chewing of gum is not allowed on the school site.

- Students will wear their full uniform with pride.
- Students will keep their hands, feet and objects to themselves.
- Students will greet visitors with respect.
- Students are expected to be silent in assembly.

Bullying – Targeting another student (s) with threatening and /or repetitive, negative actions resulting in a feeling of fear or intimidation Repeat offenders	Verbal reprimand, loss of privileges, mediation, parent notification, conference, in-school suspension. Counseling, referral to the police, repeat of the above consequences.
*Bus Behavior – It is critical that students behave appropriately while traveling on buses, to ensure their safety and the safety of the other passengers.	Parent notification, two weeks of not being allowed on the bus.
Cellular Phone – Cell phones cannot be turned on or visible during school hours.Repeat offenders	Cell phones will be confiscated and the parent will collect the said item. Cell phones will be kept in the school office until the end of term.
Computer/Electronic communication misuse- Any unauthorized use or misuse of computers or electronic communications Repeat offenders	Warning, parent notification, parent conference, counseling, detention. Parent conference, detention, suspension of technological privileges, for a 10 day period.
Defacing school property or others, theft/ stealing Repeat offenders	Loss of privileges parent notificaton, return item to owner, in-school suspension Receive community service, detention, referral to the police and return of items to rightful owner.

OFFENCES AND CONSEQUENCES

Disrespect	Notify parent, detention, in-school suspension, loss of privileges, counseling.
Fighting	Notify parent, loss of privileges, detention, corporal punishment, in-school suspension.
Lateness	After 10 recordings of tardiness per term, attendance officer will send letters to parents – 10 and beyond recording of tardiness, attendance officer will meet with parent, school counselor and principal.
Profanity	Verbal warning, loss of privileges, notify parent, school counseling.

*Consequences assigned by the Department of Transportation (DPT) may also be applied to the school setting. Parent/guardians are responsible for the child's public behavior. As such, parents will be held accountable for the actions of their children.

Behaviors that are prohibited on public transportation include, but are not limited to:-

- Playing of any audio devices
- Writing on seats or destruction of property
- Cursing, swearing or other disruptive behavior (loud talking, fighting, pushing)
- ➢ Littering
- ➢ Water balloons
- ➢ Hands, heads, arms or other body parts outside of window
- Standing in front of the standee line (red line)

POSTITIVE REINFORMCENT OF GOOD CONDUCT

At West Pembroke School we endeavor to motivate our students and to encourage positive conduct by incorporating a variety of positive incentives. These include:-

praise, letters to parents, calls home, treats, field trips, stickers,

assembly recognition, special privileges, free grub days, and lunch with the principal. On the last assembly day of each month a special assembly will take place to honor those students who display cooperation, courtesy and respectful deportment.

Specifically, this school year, we intend to:-

- issue 'Delighted to Inform You...' notifications every Friday during assembly. Each class will submit a form.
- include the honoring of students with consistently good behavior as part of the end-of-year prize giving ceremony (or Honors Assembly).
- increase the number of positive calls made to parents.
- place visual signs about the school encouraging good behavior.
- issue deportment pins to deserving students.


CRITERIA FOR CHOOSING PREFECTS
