# **Cleanup Chart**

### **Primary Objectives**

1b. Follows limits and expectations

## Why It's Important

Your child's need for adult assistance will decrease as he learns to use and care for materials on his own. While your child once required a great deal of physical help, he may now only need a verbal reminder of how to play with and care for materials. Providing an illustrated chart of cleanup tasks eliminates the need for constant adult direction.

### **Materials**

A chart with pictures and labels of cleanup jobs

#### What You Do

- 1. Post the cleanup chart in a prominent area of the house. Read the chart with your child.
- 2. When it is time to clean up, invite your child to refer to the chart for a task. Notice which task he chooses. You saw the picture of putting crayons away, and now you are picking up your crayons and putting them back in the box.
- 3. When your child finishes cleaning up, go back to the chart and ask him to show you which task(s) he completed.
- 4. Acknowledge how helpful it is to have your child cleaning up. Now we have room to dance because you put the toys away that were on the floor.
- 5. Be sure to offer no more assistance than is necessary. Use verbal prompts along with the chart as needed.
